**Language of conversation is Russian**

Kulakhmetov: Yes

Kurashvili: Miniurovich, have you seen the photos of the explosions?

Kulakhmetov: What?

Kurashvili: Explosions of 120 mm, 100 mm, 82 mm, those that “worked” on Sarabuki. Haven’t you been shown those photos?

Kulakhmetov: Yes, I saw them.

Kurashvili: Can we conduct an additional monitoring to determine the places from where this could have happened? Specialists say that they can find out from where the shells were launched.

Kulakhmetov: If it was a mortar shell, it is not possible to find out, you can only say approximately.

Kurashvili: And the 100 [mm]... the 100 [mm] was launched from a very close distance, as they say. The tail shows the direction and we can find out from where all this happened. If they were shooting from the trees, the burns should exist, we’ll find some traces.

Kulakhmetov: Do you know that the tail is the first what falls off and disappears. The tail won’t help you to find out from where it was launched...

Kurashvili: On the photo one can see what’s under no. 67. When it flew, it seemed to be streaming upwards and the line where it touched has remained, the direction is distinguishable, it has cut the ground. If you look at it, you’ll notice.

Kulakhmetov: All right, I understood.
